HUNTERS HILL AND THE GREAT WAR

See how the people of Hunters Hill rose to the challenge of recruitment, supported the troops, and how the newspapers reported the war at home and abroad

New exhibition shows what we did in The Great War

he Hunters Hill Historical Society, in association with the History Council of NSW, has chosen Hunters Hill And The Great War as its second major exhibition for 2014. Being one of Australia's oldest suburbs, Hunters Hill was in a position to play a prominent part in raising troops and organising financial support. All material for the exhibition comes from the Society's archives or was loaned by local people. The exhibition was curated by Eunice Farram.

Shortly after the start of the war, a Patriotic Fund was opened in Sydney to raise money for the comfort of troops. The Hunters Hill War Fund Committee was formed at a public meeting, with some 50 people joining, led by the Mayor and aldermen. Various functions were held to raise funds. The exhibition includes programs for a Grand Patriotic Carnival, held at the Avenue Picnic Grounds on 31 October 1914, as well as Grand Patriotic Concerts at the Hunters Hill Town Hall on 6 October 1914 and 14 April 1915. These functions were held under the direction of Henry E. Budden, an architect, who was the Australian War Chest Commissioner. Sweet peas were grown on the nature strip in

Chris Schofield was elected President of Hunters Hill Historical Society at the August AGM. Chris has lived in Hunters Hill for just on 30 years, and was a local Councillor. He is a volunteer at 2RPH, Radio For The Print Handicapped, and is the archivist at All Saints' Hunters Hill.



Passy Avenue for sale to raise money. A total of £19,000 was raised, making Hunters Hill the first of all municipalities in fund raising per head of population.

Early in the war, the Hunters Hill Rifle Club was formed to teach men drill and the use of arms. When the need for recruits became more urgent, a recruiting committee was formed, but it was found there were few fit and free men who had not already enlisted. Hunters Hill had a total of 402 men enlisting, or 1 in 6 of all males, based on the 1911 census, compared to 1 in 8 for Australia overall. A feature of recruitment was the Hunters Hill Hun Hunting Hundred. This group was formed in July 1918, and was largely comprised of married men with families who had decided to join up despite family responsibilities. The organisers were W.R. Goulding, C.E. Holgate, and W.C. Howard. As men returned, a club was formed and club rooms built on land donated by Dr Robinson. Money for the building was raised by the War Fund Committee, with assistance from Mr Windeyer. This club later became Hunters Hill RSL.

The exhibition contains photographs, documents and decorations of Hunters Hill people who served in the war effort at home and overseas. There are also newspapers of the time, including details of the Armistice, the Conscription Referendum of 1916 and general war news, as well as life on the home front and honour rolls of those who served. The exhibition will remain in place until February 2015.
